- › Document patients' care and treatment plans
- › Educate patients about oral hygiene techniques

Employment Outlook & Statistics

Dental hygiene is projected to be one of the 30 fastest growing occupations in future years. Due to the success of preventive dentistry in reducing the incidence of oral disease, the expanding older population will retain their teeth longer and will be even more aware of the importance of regular dental care. With the emphasis on preventive care, dentists will need to employ more dental hygienists than ever before to meet the increased demand for dental services. (Source: American Dental Association)

Academic Requirements

In Minnesota, there are currently 11 dental hygiene education programs in community colleges, technical colleges, and universities. They offer associate and baccalaureate programs. Additionally, dental hygienists may pursue a master's degree for alternative career options in dentistry including research, clinical practice in school health programs, and academia.

To work as a dental hygienist in Minnesota, an individual must have graduated from an accredited dental hygiene program, pass a national written board and practical examinations, and be licensed with the state of Minnesota.
